

Decision 19.189: Technical Workshop on *Aquatic species listed in the CITES Appendices*23 – 24 April 2024 (CICG, Geneva, Switzerland)

CRITERIA FOR THE AMENDMENT OF APPENDICES I AND II: PROCESSES TO DATE

- This document has been prepared by the Secretariat and provides information relating to the processes to review and amend the criteria for the amendment of Appendices I and II over time. Links to documents and reports considered during these processes are provided to facilitate access to information that may be of interest to workshop participants.
- 2. The Secretariat notes that consultative processes involving Parties, the Standing Committee, Animals and Plants Committees, specialized agencies of the United Nations, inter-governmental and non-governmental organizations were followed to review the criteria. The scope of taxa included in the Appendices was considered throughout these processes and included a review of selected taxa by the Animals and Plants Committees to ensure that the applicability of the criteria to a broad array of taxa is assessed.
- 3. Annex 5 of <u>Resolution Conf. 9.24 (Rev. CoP17)</u> on the *Criteria for amendment of Appendices I and II* includes various reminders that taxon-specific considerations should be taken into consideration. The following note is included in bold at the beginning of Annex 5:
 - "NOTE: Where numerical guidelines are cites in this Annex, they are presented only as examples, since it is impossible to give numerical values that are applicable to all taxa because of differences in their biology."
- 4. The following definitions in Annex 5 of Resolution Conf. 9.24 (Rev. CoP17) include references to taxon-specific considerations:

Area of distribution:

".....The determination that a species has a restricted area of distribution is taxon-specific and should take into account considerations such as habitat specificity, population density and endemism."

o Decline:

".... The judgement that a decline is marked is taxon-specific and can be justified by a number of considerations, for example the population dynamics of a related taxonomic group. A general guideline for a marked historical extent of decline is a percentage decline to 5%-30% of the baseline, depending on the biology and productivity of the species...

The extremes of 5% and 30% will be applicable to only a relatively small number of species, but some species may even fall outside of these extremes. However, both these figures are presented only as examples, since it is impossible to give numerical values that are applicable to all taxa because of differences in their biology...

A general guideline for a marked recent rate of decline is a percentage decline of 50% or more in the last 10 years or three generations, whichever is the longer. If the population is small, a percentage decline of 20% or more in the last 5 years or 2 generations (whichever is the longer) may be more appropriate. However, these figures are presented only as examples, since it is impossible to give numerical values that are applicable to all taxa because of differences in their biology...".

Footnote 2:

"..... In considering the percentages indicated above, account needs to be taken of taxon- and case-specific biological and other factors that are likely to affect extinction risk. Depending on the biology, patterns of exploitation and area of distribution of the taxon, vulnerability factors (as listed in this Annex) may increase this risk, whereas mitigating factors (e.g. large absolute numbers or refugia) may reduce it."

o Small wild population:

"The judgement that a wild population is small is taxon-specific and can be justified by a number of considerations, for example the population of a related taxonomic group. For some low-productivity species where data exist to make an estimate, a figure of less than 5,000 individuals has been found to be an appropriate guideline (not a threshold) of what constitutes a small wild population, but the number could be higher for higher productivity species. However, this figure is presented only as an example, since it is impossible to give numerical values that are applicable to all taxa. There will be many cases where this numerical guideline does not apply."

o Very small wild subpopulation:

"The judgement that a wild subpopulation is very small is taxon-specific. For some species where data exist to make an estimate, a figure of less than 500 individuals has been found to be an appropriate guideline (not a threshold) of what constitutes a very small wild subpopulation. However, this figure is presented only as an example, since it is impossible to give numerical values that are applicable to all taxa. There will be many cases where this numerical guideline does not apply."

o Threatened with extinction:

"Threatened with extinction' is defined in Annex 1. The vulnerability of a species to threats of extinction depends on its population demographics, biological characteristics (such as body size, trophic level, life cycle, breeding structure or social structure requirements for successful reproduction), and vulnerability due to aggregating habits, natural fluctuations in population size, or residency/migratory patterns. This makes it impossible to give numerical threshold values for population size or area of distribution that are applicable to all taxa."

5. The following sections provide information relating to the criteria to amend Appendix I and II and the processes to review the criteria to amend Appendices I and II, starting with the fundamental principles in the Text of the Convention and documents and reports considered by the Standing Committee, the Animals and Plants Committees and the meetings of the Conference of the Parties to CITES.

Text of the Convention

- 6. Article II of the Convention sets out the fundamental principles of the Convention, namely the definition of the three CITES Appendices and the general principle that no trade in specimens of species listed in the Appendices can take place except in accordance with the provisions of the Convention:
 - 1. Appendix I shall include all species threatened with extinction which are or may be affected by trade. Trade in specimens of these species must be subject to particularly strict regulation in order not to endanger further their survival and must only be authorized in exceptional circumstances.

2. Appendix II shall include:

- (a) all species which although not necessarily now threatened with extinction may become so unless trade in specimens of such species is subject to strict regulation in order to avoid utilization incompatible with their survival; and
- (b) other species which must be subject to regulation in order that trade in specimens of certain species referred to in sub-paragraph (a) of this paragraph may be brought under effective control.

Bern criteria

- 7. The first meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention (CoP1, Bern, November 1976) adopted Resolution Conf. 1.1 on *Criteria for the Addition of Species and Other Taxa to Appendices I and II and for the Transfer of Species and Other Taxa from Appendix II to Appendix I and Resolution Conf.* 1.2 on *Criteria for the Deletion of Species and Other Taxa from Appendices I and II.*
- 8. In Resolution Conf. 1.1 the Parties DECIDED that in determining the appropriate appendix into which a species or other taxon be placed the biological and trade status of the taxon should be evaluated together.
- 9. Criteria as in Resolution Conf. 1.1:

App II	To qualify for Appendix II, species need not currently be threatened with extinction, but there should be some indication that they might become so. Such an indication might be a decreasing or very limited population size or geographic range of distribution. Information on biological status should be one of the types required for Appendix I species.	Species meeting the biological criteria should be listed if they presently are subject to trade or are likely to become subject to trade. The latter situation can arise where heavy trade in one species is extended to include similar species if the demand grows or if supplies of the one species are depleted.

Genera should be listed if some of their species are threatened and identification of individual species within the genus is difficult. The same should apply to listing any smaller taxa within larger ones.	The amount of trade that a species can sustain without threat of extinction generally will be greater for species in Appendix II then for those in Appendix I, so there should be evidence of actual or expected trade in such a volume as to constitute a potential threat to survival of the species.
