Maintained sample copies of permits and certificates and signatures of signatories for most Parties Answered queries from Parties about the acceptability of particular CITES permits and certificates and facilitating dialogue between Parties on such matters and circulated Notifications to the Parties in relation to cancelled, lost, stolen or destroyed permits or certificates.  The Secretariat has maintained a reference list of Parties using phytosanitary certificates as certificates of artificial propagation and, with the concurrence of the Animals Committee, a list of coral taxa where identification to genus level is acceptable. The Secretariat has reported at each meeting of the Animals Committee on the availability of information on shared stocks of Acipenseriformes species and its activities related to the conservation of and trade in sturgeons and paddlefish. However, due to the lack of fishing and trade in specimens from such stocks, further analysis and follow-up has been limited.

Additionally, the Secretariat managed the process of seeking candidates for vacancies on the Committees and the provisions related to Conflict of Interest in the Animals and Plants Committees.
11.3 (Rev. CoP16) Compliance and enforcement	The Secretariat provided extensive support to the Standing Committee in its administration of compliance procedures and undertook actions under Article XIII of the Convention. It fully briefed Parties and the Standing Committee at all stages. It maintained a list of trade suspension recommendations on the CITES website.  The Secretariat also included on the CITES website, contact details of the relevant national law-enforcement agencies responsible for investigating illegal trafficking in wild fauna and flora in each Party. In cooperate with ICCWC partner organizations, regional and subregional wildlife enforcement networks, it supported the efforts of Parties to enforce the requirements of the Convention, preparing and distributing training material and facilitating the exchange of technical information between the authorities in charge of border controls. No funds were available to provide direct support to range States of the Tibetan antelope in order to improve anti-poaching efforts, to carry out population censuses, to formulate a conservation strategy and to prevent trade in Tibetan antelope parts and derivatives.

CoP13)  Conservation of and trade in tortoises and freshwater turtles	Range States have not called upon the Secretariat to assist with the funding and development of CITES-listed tortoises and freshwater turtles management strategies and action plans to deal with seized and confiscated live specimens in accordance with this Resolution.
