CITES history: Listed at Washington, D.C., 1973. The USSR had suggested listing of the whole species <u>Picus</u> squamatus. Has never been reviewed.

None listed.

There is no ID Manual data sheet available.

6. Comments from Countries of Origin

Part of the information provided above is based on questionnaires completed by China, Nepal and Pakistan. China indicated that the subspecies <u>flavirostris</u> does not occur in China. Nepal and Pakistan do not feel that the situation of the species would become more critical if removed from Appendix II, and both Management Authorities are tentatively in favour of the proposal.

The Management Authorities of the other range states did not return the questionnaire.
