- 21. Population Status: Endangered.
- 22. Population Trend: Rare.
- 23. <u>Distribution</u>: U.P. (Garhwal), Sikkim. Bhutan, S.E. Tibet.
- 24. Habitat Availablity: Along moist hill slopes and sub-alpine meadows at alt. 2800-3300 m.
- 25. <u>Geographic Trend</u>: The species was restricted to Sikkim Himalayas but recently has been reported from Valley of Flowers in Garhwal Himalayas.
- 26. <u>Threats</u>: As restricted to small pockets only, all precautionary measures are being taken for protection.

31. National Utilization: Horticultural, scientific and ornamental.

- 33. <u>Illegal Trade</u>: Insufficient data available.
- 34. <u>Actual Potential Trade Impact</u>: For its handsome foliage and delightful flowers with large pouch the species has got high potential trade impact.
- 35. Captive Breeding and Artificial Propagation (outside country of origin): Not known.

4. Conservation and Management

41. Legal Status

- 411. National: Export of wild orchids prohibited under the Export (Control) Order.
- 412. International: Export regulated under Appendix II of CITES.

42. Species Management

- 421. Population Monitoring: To be undertaken.
- 422. <u>Habitat Conservation</u>: The newly reported population spot is protected in Valley of Flowers National Park.
- 423. <u>Management Measures</u>: Plans for species to be introduced in other National Parks and Orchidaria of similar habitat. Multiplication and propagation through tissue culture method is being undertaken.

43. Control Measures

- 431. <u>International Trade</u>: Export regulated through inclusion in Appendix II of CITES.
- 432. <u>Domestic Measures</u>: Measures are being taken to protect the wild sources as the species is restricted to isolated small pockets only.

5. Information on Similar Species

- 51. <u>Similarity in Appearance</u>: All *Cypripedium* species belong to "Lady's Slipper" Orchid group, and superficially the habit of seedlings and flowers look alike but *Cypripedium tibeticum* is easily distinguished from other by its flowers ca 5 cm across with white flushed and purplish veined tip of 3.5-5 cm long.
- 52. Nature of Specimens in Trade: Seedlings, mature plants and flowers.

7. Additional Remarks

<u>Description</u>: Terrestrial, hairy herbs 15-30 cm high. Leaves 3-5, alternate, elliptic to broadly ovate. $4.5-12 \times 3-6 \text{ cm}$. Flower solitary, ca 5 cm across, white flushed and veined with purplish red. Lip globe, 3.5-5 cm long.
