The Secretary-General introduced his successor Mr John Scanlon, who would take up his post in May 2010, and wished him well in his new role. Mr John Scanlon expressed his gratitude for the opportunity and said he looked forward to working with the CITES community.

#### 4. <u>Credentials Committee</u>

Belgium, as Chair of the Credentials Committee, reported that, of the 158 Parties with delegations registered at CoP15, credentials from 149 Parties had been <u>accepted</u> by the Committee.

- 6. Financing and budgeting of the Secretariat and of meetings of the Conference of the Parties
  - 6.1 <u>Terms of reference of the Finance and Budget Subcommittee</u>

The Chair of Committee II reported that the terms of reference of the Finance and Budget Subcommittee in the Annex to document CoP15. Doc. 6.1 had been agreed, with the deletion of "one day" in paragraph 2 a). The terms of reference were <u>adopted</u>.

6.2 Financial reports for the years 2007 and 2008

The Chair of Committee II reported that document CoP15 Doc. 6.2 (Rev. 1) had been noted by Committee II. The document was <u>noted</u>.

6.3 Implementation of the costed programme of work for 2009

The Chair of Committee II reported that document CoP15 Doc. 6.3 (Rev. 1) had been noted by Committee II. The document was <u>noted</u>.

6.4 Implementation of the costed programme of work for 2010 and 2011

The Chair of Committee II reported that document CoP15 Doc. 6.4 (Rev. 1) had been referred to the Budget Working Group for consideration.

Mali raised their objection to the title of the document, noting that the activities for 2010 and 2011 had not yet been implemented. They requested specific figures for the costed programme of work (CPW). The Secretary-General responded that the document was appropriately titled, that the CPW for 2009-2011 had already been adopted at CoP14 and that document CoP15 Doc. 6.4 (Rev. 1) was a report on the programmatic activities of the Secretariat. He also noted that any unspent funds from 2009 were carried over to the same activities in 2010 and that the CPW allowed for modifications to be made by the Conference of the Parties based on decisions adopted at the present meeting.

# 6.5 Costed programme of work for 2012 to 2013

The Chair of Committee II reported that document CoP15 Doc. 6.5 (Rev. 1) had been referred to the Budget Working Group. The working group had prepared a draft resolution on *Financing and budgeting of the Secretariat and of meetings of the Conference of the Parties*, including the scale of contributions for the biennium 2012-2013, indicating the total budget for the period, which had been agreed in Committee II. Both the draft resolution and the scale of contributions could be found in document CoP15 Com. II. 39. The Chair of the Budget Working Group had requested that the staffing table be included in the summary record of the Committee and asked the plenary to agree.

Swaziland stressed the importance of the role of the Secretariat and, in recognition, volunteered to increase their contribution by 100 %, encouraging other Parties to follow their initiative in order to help CITES fulfil its mandates. The Secretary-General, noting the success in obtaining voluntary contributions in 2008 and 2009, thanked Swaziland for their initiative and encouraged other Parties to make similar voluntary contributions.

Mexico raised concerns that document CoP15 Com. II. 39 did not specify the percentage increase in the budget. The United States of America raised a point of order that, in the absence of a motion to reopen debate, detailed discussions could not occur. The Secretary-General concurred, stating that the Rules of Procedure must be followed and that if Parties wished to reopen the debate, they must follow the proper procedures.

Greece announced that they would strive to fulfil their financial commitments but, given their economic situation, may not be able to do so.

Documents CoP15 Doc. 6.4 (Rev. 1) and CoP15 Doc. 6.5 (Rev. 1) were <u>accepted</u>, and the draft resolution, and the staffing table (see Annex 1), in document CoP15 Com. II. 39 were <u>adopted</u>.

#### 6.6 Non-payment of contributions

The Chair of Committee II reported that the four draft decisions in Annex 2 of document CoP15 Doc. 6.6 (Rev. 1) had been agreed by consensus.

Safari Club International announced their contribution of USD 25,000 to the CPW for 2010-2011 and encouraged other non-governmental organizations to do the same.

The four draft decisions in Annex 2 of document CoP15 Doc. 6.6 (Rev. 1) were adopted.

The United States stated that, if questions were raised regarding whether the elected members of the Animals and Plants Committees served as representatives of regions or Parties, Parties would need to refer to Resolution Conf. 11.1 (Rev. CoP14), not the decision reflected in document CoP15 Plen. Doc. 1.

Mr Thomas Althaus, the outgoing Chair of the Animals Committee, was commended for his work and presented with a gold pin by the Secretary-General.

The Secretary-General proposed that the Secretariat could initiate a postal vote in order to formally elect chairs of the scientific committees to enable them to commence their work intersessionally. Mexico, supported by Mali, noted that, typically, the scientific committees met on the last day of the CoP to elect their chair. The United States, supported by Chile, Mexico, and Norway, suggested that the Committees elect preliminary chairs at the end of the CoP, which could then be confirmed by postal vote prior to the next meeting of the Animals and Plants Committees. The Chair of the Plants Committee agreed with the election of chairs on a provisional basis. The Chair noted that there was no support for the proposal of the Secretariat and that the Animals and Plants Committees should therefore proceed to organize their election as in the past.

# 8. Implementation of the Strategic Vision: 2008-2013

The Chair of Committee II reported that this subject had been dealt with in conjunction with agenda item 21, and it was <u>agreed</u> by the Parties to be discussed with agenda item 21.

#### 9. <u>Review of the scientific committees</u>

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed amendment to Resolution Conf. 11.1 (Rev. CoP14) contained in paragraph 5 of document CoP15 Doc. 9 had been agreed by consensus. This document was <u>adopted</u>.

#### 10. Cooperation with other organizations

#### 10.1 Synergy with biodiversity-related international initiatives

The Chair of Committee I reported that the two draft decisions on *Post-2010 biodiversity targets* and the *Biodiversity Indicators Partnership* in the Annex to document CoP15 Doc. 10.1 had been accepted by consensus. He added that the six further draft decisions on the *Intergovernmental Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services* and on *Climate change* in document CoP15 Com. I. 12 had also been accepted by consensus with a minor amendment to the Spanish version recorded in summary record Com. I Rec. 12.

Guinea expressed concern that the original mission of CITES as an environmental convention was being overpowered by economic interests. They felt that CITES was encouraging trade rather than regulating it to protect endangered species. They stressed the need for the environmental vision to prevail especially when collaborating with other international initiatives.

The draft decisions contained in documents CoP15 Doc. 10.1 and CoP15 Com. I. 12, along with the amendments to the Spanish version of the latter recorded in summary record Com. I Rec. 12, were <u>adopted</u>.

#### 10.2 Cooperation with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations

The Chair of Committee I reported that the second session of the Plenary had referred paragraph 25 of document CoP15 Doc. 10.2 to Committee I for discussion. The Committee had

discussed the matter contained in this paragraph, but accepted that no further action was needed. This was <u>adopted</u>.

#### 10.4 Global Strategy for Plant Conservation of the Convention on Biological Diversity

The Chair of Committee I reported that a draft decision on *Cooperation with other organizations: Global Strategy for Plant Conservation of the CBD* in Annex 2 of document CoP15 Doc. 10.4 had been agreed by consensus. This was <u>adopted</u>.

### 12. Harmonization of nomenclature and taxonomy with other Multilateral Environmental Agreements

The Chair of Committee I reported that draft amendments to Resolution Conf. 12.11 (Rev. CoP14) on *Standard Nomenclature* in the Annex to document CoP15 Doc. 12 had been accepted by consensus. This was <u>adopted</u>.

Pakistan requested that their objection to the merging of the Ganges river dolphin and the Indus river dolphin as a single species be placed on the record.

#### 13. <u>Cooperation between Parties and promotion of multilateral measures</u>

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed amendment to Decision 14.29 presented in the Annex to document CoP15 Doc. 13 had been accepted. It had also been agreed to retain both Decision 14.28, with an amendment recorded in summary record CoP15 Com. II Rec. 2, and Decision 14.30, unamended. The final text of the Decisions contained in document CoP15 Com II. 1 was adopted.

#### 14. <u>CITES and livelihoods</u>

The Chair of Committee II reported that the draft resolution in document CoP15 Doc. 14 Annex 1 had been rejected. The three draft decisions in Annex 2 of the document had been accepted with one amendment. The final agreed text contained in document CoP15 Com. II. 2 was <u>adopted</u>.

#### 15. National wildlife trade policy reviews

The Chair of Committee II reported that the draft resolution in document CoP15 Doc. 15 Annex 1 had been amended and accepted by consensus. The final text in document CoP15 Com II. 3, and the draft decision in Annex 2 of the document, were <u>adopted</u>.

#### 16. Capacity Building

#### 16.1 <u>Report of the Secretariat</u>

The Chair of Committee II reported that it had been agreed to retain Decision 14.10, and that two approved draft decisions had resulted from discussions by the Committee. These were contained in document CoP15 Com. II. 6 and were <u>adopted</u>.

### 16.2 International expert workshop on non-detriment findings

#### 16.2.1 Report of the Secretariat

The Chair of Committee I reported that document CoP15 Doc. 16.2.1 had been noted. This was <u>agreed</u>.

#### 16.2.2 Report of the Animals and Plants Committees

The Chair of Committee I reported that three draft decisions regarding *Non-detriment findings*, contained in document CoP15 Com. I. 9, had been accepted by consensus. These were <u>adopted</u>.

#### 16.3 Non-detriment findings for timber, medicinal plants and agarwood

The Chair of Committee I reported that two draft decisions regarding *Non-detriment findings for timber, medicinal plants and agarwood*, contained in document CoP15 Com. I. 7, had been accepted by consensus. These were <u>adopted</u>.

#### 17. Incentives for the implementation of the Convention

The Chair of Committee II reported that the draft decisions contained in document CoP15 Doc. 17 Annex had been rejected. This rejection was <u>confirmed</u>.

18. <u>Review of Resolutions</u>

The Chair of Committee II reported that an amendment to Resolution Conf. 11.10 (Rev. CoP14) proposed by the United States during discussion in Committee II had been agreed by consensus and was presented in document CoP15 Com. II. 7, but with the deletion of "in diameter" from the proposed definition of "coral fragments". This was <u>adopted</u>.

In addition, an amendment to Resolution Conf. 4.6 (Rev. CoP13), proposed by Mexico during the discussion, had been agreed by consensus, as contained in document CoP15 Com. II. 17. This was adopted.

Annex 1 Resolution Conf. 5.10, Definition of 'primarily commercial purposes'

The Chair of Committee II reported that the draft revision of Resolution Conf. 5.10 had been accepted by consensus, together with the amendment recorded in document CoP15 Com. II Rec. 3. The revised version in document CoP15 Com. II. 8 was <u>adopted</u>.

Annex 2 <u>Resolution Conf. 7.12 (Rev.), Marking requirements for trade in specimens of taxa with</u> populations in both Appendix I and Appendix II

The Chair of Committee II reported that the draft revision of Resolution Conf. 7.12 (Rev) had been accepted by consensus and this was <u>adopted</u>.

Annex 3 Resolution Conf. 9.5 (Rev. CoP14), Trade with States not party to the Convention

The Chair of Committee II reported that the draft revision of Resolution Conf. 9.5 (Rev. CoP14) in Annex 3 b), with amendments recorded in summary record CoP15 Com. II Rec. 3, had been accepted by consensus. The revised version of the Resolution, incorporating the amendments, contained in document CoP15 Com. II. 9 was <u>adopted</u>.

Annex 4 Resolution Conf. 9.7 (Rev. CoP13), Transit and transhipment

The Chair of Committee II reported that the draft revision of Resolution Conf. 9.7 (Rev. CoP13) in Annex 4 a), with amendments recorded in summary record CoP15 Com. II Rec. 4, had been accepted by consensus. He highlighted a necessary correction in the preambular paragraph beginning with "NOTING" as follows: replacement of the final "specimens in transit" with "specimens of species included in the CITES Appendices". The revised version in document CoP15 Com. II. 10 was adopted.

Annex 5 <u>Resolution Conf. 9.10 (Rev. CoP14)</u>, <u>Disposal of illegally traded, confiscated and</u> <u>accumulated specimens</u>

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed revision of Resolution Conf. 9.10 (Rev. CoP14) in Annex 5 b), with amendments recorded in summary record CoP15 Com. II Rec. 4, had been accepted by consensus. The revised version in document CoP15 Com. II. 18 was adopted.

The revision included a proposed transfer of a paragraph from Resolution Conf. 9.10 (Rev. CoP14) to Resolution Conf. 10.7. The resulting amendment to the latter Resolution, as contained in document CoP15 Com. II. 20 was <u>adopted</u>.

Annex 6 <u>Resolution Conf. 9.19 (Rev. CoP13)</u>, *Guidelines for the registration of nurseries exporting* artificially propagated specimens of Appendix-I species

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed revision of Resolution Conf. 9.19 (Rev. CoP13) in Annex 6 c), had been accepted by consensus in Committee II and this was adopted.

Annex 7 Resolution Conf. 10.10 (Rev. CoP14), Trade in elephant specimens

The Chair of Committee II reported that, following discussion of the Secretariat's proposal to review Resolution Conf. 10.10 (Rev. CoP14), a new draft decision to this effect had been approved. The final text in document CoP15 Com. II. 23 was <u>adopted</u>.

Annex 8 Resolution Conf. 11.11 (Rev. CoP14), Regulation of trade in plants

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed correction to Resolution Conf. 11.11 (Rev. CoP14) contained in document CoP15 Doc. 18 Annex 8 b) had been accepted by consensus and this was <u>adopted</u>.

Annex 9 Resolution Conf. 11.21 (Rev. CoP14), Use of annotations in Appendices I and II

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed amendments to Resolution Conf. 11.21 (Rev. CoP14) contained in document CoP15 Doc. 18 Annex 9, with amendments, had been accepted by consensus. The final text in document CoP15 Com. II. 21 was <u>adopted</u>.

Annex 10 Resolution Conf. 12.2, Procedure for approval of externally funded projects

The Chair of Committee II reported that deletion of Resolution Conf. 12.2 had been agreed, and the draft decision contained in document CoP15 Annex 10 b), with a small amendment, had been approved.

The United States, supported by Chile and Mexico, requested opening debate on this agenda item. Spain, on behalf of the European Union and its Member States, opposed their request and the matter proceeded to a vote (see Annex 2). The results were 32 in favour, 60 against and 41 abstentions and, accordingly, the debate was opened.

The United States noted their strong support for the intent of the draft decision but recognized that there were many other ways of securing external funding, which did not always require a financial mechanism. They suggested replacing the words "a financial mechanism" in the draft decision with "the means". This was <u>agreed</u> and the final text in document CoP15 Com. II. 22, was <u>adopted</u> as amended.

Annex 11 Resolution Conf. 12.3 (Rev. CoP14), Permits and certificates

The Chair of Committee II reported that, with regard to the proposed amendments to Resolution Conf. 12.3 (Rev. CoP14), working groups had been established to discuss the definition of "hunting trophy", the definition of source code "C", and the requirement for endorsement of permits and certificates at the time of export. Agreement had been reached on all of these amendments, as well as on others proposed by the Secretariat in document CoP15 Doc. 18, Annex 11 b), but not on the amendment of the definition of source code "F". These were <u>adopted</u>.

Amendments to Resolution Conf. 12.3 (Rev. CoP14) had also been agreed during discussions of agenda items 30.2 and 34.

#### 30. Electronic permitting

#### 30.2 Proposed revision of Resolution Conf. 12.3 (Rev. CoP14) on Permits and certificates

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed amendment to Resolution Conf. 12.3 in the Annex to document CoP15 Doc. 30.2 (Rev. 1) had been accepted, with an amendment that was

recorded in summary record CoP15 Com. II Rec. 9. The final draft, as reflected in document CoP15 Com. II. 41, was <u>adopted</u>.

### 34. Review of the universal tagging system and trade in small crocodilian leather goods

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed amendments to Resolution Conf. 12.3, in Annex 2 of document CoP15 Doc. 34, had been accepted by consensus and were included in document CoP15 Com. II. 41. These were <u>adopted</u>. The proposed amendments to Resolution Conf. 11.12, in Annex 1 of the working document, had also been accepted by consensus. These were <u>adopted</u>.

18. <u>Review of Resolutions</u> (continuation)

#### Annex 12 <u>Resolution Conf. 12.10 (Rev. CoP14), Guidelines for a procedure to register and monitor</u> operations that breed Appendix-I animal species for commercial purposes

The Chair of Committee II reported that a working group had been formed to discuss the proposed amendments to Resolution Conf. 12.10 (Rev. CoP14) and had provided a revised proposal, contained in document CoP15 Com. II. 4. This had been accepted with an amendment during the 10th session of Committee II. The revised version in document CoP15 Com. II. 37 was <u>adopted</u>.

# Annex 13 Resolution Conf. 14.7, Management of nationally established export quotas

The Chair of Committee II reported that the proposed amendment to Resolution Conf. 14.7 contained in document CoP15 Doc. 18 Annex 13 had been accepted by consensus and this was <u>adopted</u>.

The session was adjourned at 11h55.
