18th meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES CoP 18)

<u>Information on the exercise of the right to vote by</u> the European Union or the EU Member States

- 1. CoP 18 will be the second meeting of the Conference of the Parties after the entry into force of the Gaborone Amendment to Article XXI of the Convention in November 2013 and the subsequent accession of the European Union (EU) as the first regional economic integration organisation (REIO) in 2015.
- 2. In relation to the Rules of Procedure, Rule 26 (Right to vote), the EU and its Member States would like to inform all Parties that, should a matter on the agenda of the CITES CoP 18 be submitted to a vote, the right to vote by the EU or the EU Member States will be exercised in accordance with the Annex to this document. With the exception of budgetary matters, the EU and its Member States will cast their votes in accordance with positions agreed between them, as has been the practice at previous CoPs meetings.
- 3. Votes in application of CITES CoP Rules of Procedure 14 (Publicity of debates), 20 (Procedural motions) and 21 (Motions to open and reopen debates in plenary sessions) will be cast by the EU Member States.
- 4. The indications in the Annex may be subject to change in view of new circumstances or information. Any change will be communicated to Parties in advance of the vote.
- 5. This information on the exercise of the right to vote is provided by the EU and its Member States, on their own initiative, for practical purposes for CoP 18 and it is without prejudice to the rights and obligations of the EU and its Member States in other international fora.
