	If possible, please specity per group of species or attach details. The greatest number of cases was detected at border customs office at Brnik Airport. In most of these cases customs officers found skeletons of stony corals (Scleractinia spp.) and shells of Giant clam (<i>Tridacna</i> spp.) and Queen conch (<i>Strombus gigas</i>). They also detected hunting trophies and parts of mammals (Cetacea spp., <i>Canis lupus, Loxodonta africana, Hippopotamus amphibius</i>) and several tortoise shells of the species <i>Geochelone pardalis</i> . In 2004 customs officers at Brnik Airport seized and confiscated a number of live cacti as well as their parts from genuses <i>Polaskia</i> spp. and <i>Trichocereus</i> spp. In the same year a number of intended illegal imports of traditional Chinese medicine (TCM) were detected at the Brnik Airport and at Customs post office. These shipments contained parts of specimens of CITES listed species (<i>Panthera pardus</i> , <i>Moschus</i> spp., <i>Manis pentadactyla</i> , <i>Panax quinquefolius</i> and <i>Cistanche deserticola</i>). The customs officers at the road border ports Obrežje and Gruškovje detected several cases of illegal import of Greek tortoises (<i>Testudo hermanni</i>), stuffed buzzard (<i>Buteo buteo</i>) and considerable quantity of stony corals. At border ports Dragonja and Sečovlje customs officers regularly detected illegal shipments of large quantities of Date mussel (<i>Lithophaga lithophaga</i>). In all cases, the border customs offices asked the Management Authority to verify if the seized specimens belong to CITES listed species. If the Management Authority had established, on the basis of the opinion of the Scientific Authority, that the specimens in question did not belong to CITES species, the shipment was released. Where the violation of the Convention had been approved, customs officers seized the specimens and the owners renounced them to the benefit of the State. Inter-sectoral Committee for the Prevention of Illegal Wildlife Trade

Since 2002, a special inter-sectoral committee for the prevention of illegal wildlife trade has been operating in Slovenia. It was established by a decision of the ministers for the environment and spatial planning, for internal affairs and for finance, pursuant to Article 49 of the *Public Administration Act* (Official Gazette of RS Nrs. 67/94, 20/95, 29/95, 80/99, 52/02, 56/02). The Committee consists of permanent members from the Criminal Police Directorate (Interpol central bureau for Slovenia), the General Customs Directorate (Investigation Division) and the Environmental Agency. Its objective is concerted action in the prevention and control of illegal trade in endangered animal and plant species. The duties of the Committee are to collect data and exchange information on illegal activities related to trade in endangered species, to prepare administrative and other measures, to organise joint actions aimed at the detection of illegal activities and to offer technical assistance in investigations. The chair of the Committee is responsible for coordinating its work. For the realization of certain tasks other officials from relevant ministries may be appointed. The Committee may ask relevant divisions of ministries for assistance in particular task. The Committee is obliged to report to the relevant ministers on its activities every six months.

In early 2002 the Management Authority issued various publicity materials targeted to different interest groups. The material included bookmarks, leaflets, suitcase lockets, two posters and the manual for the implementation of the Convention. Publicity material was printed in large edition and distributed to all target groups. Schools, libraries, bookstores, tourist agencies, border customs offices etc. participated in the distribution of the material. The material was redistributed in 2004.

The Environmental Agency in cooperation with the Customs Administration prepared several thematic press conferences, which were followed by articles in all main national newspapers and broadcasts on National TV and Radio and commercial TV stations

The Environmental Agency prepared a thematic exhibition on trade in endangered species and CITES Convention at the fair »Student arena« which is the largest exhibition dedicated to students and youth. Management Authority also regularly participates at international tourist fair »Alpe Adria« in Ljubljana.

Management Authority prepared a permanent show windows in the departure hall of Ljubljana – Brnik international airport to inform the travellers to be cautious when buying products made of plant and animal species. In the arrival hall, several posters are displayed and leaflets and suitcase lockets are available to passengers.
